

The next BIG change is that Barbara Long is retiring from her position as Executive Director-Registrar. She has held this position since 2003, and has been on the executive since she graduated from the Dental Hygiene in 1980. She is an inventor and has worked with Hu-Friedy designing the Vision Curvettes: the first short bladed curettes. She has been involved in several research projects and is a published writer. These are just a few of her accomplishments. Although we will miss Barbara, when we look back and reflect on what she has contributed to our profession, we are truly thankful for her efforts. She has contributed to the advancement of dental hygiene locally, provincially, nationally and internationally.

We are fortunate to have hired Kellie Hildebrandt as our new Registrar-Executive Director. She brings

experience and knowledge with her and our council looks forward to working closely with her. Welcome Kellie.

Council continues to work on strategic planning for SDHA; planning for the future and looking at the hygiene trends across Canada. It is important for all Saskatchewan Dental Hygienists to know and understand what they are licensed to do to, and be able to practice efficiently and effectively.

SDHA has developed a short informational continuing competency course for our members about "Jurisprudence" which is the "knowledge of the law". This is an excellent opportunity to be able to understand and ask questions regarding our Bylaws and the Dental Disciplines Act. Please watch for dates and times for this presentation. Our profession is changing and evolving and there have been many changes with other provincial hygiene organizations. The best way for us to keep up to date is with continuing education. I encourage you to read the SDHA and CDHA emails. They are full of valuable information. CDHA is having a National Conference in Halifax in June 2011 with great educational and social programs. Council Update

The Policy Governance Model of administration and management continues to shape the structure of our Association. Diane Fletcher is retained as our policy governance coach. The President of the SDHA for the 2010-2011 term is Chris Gordon and the Vice-President is Devona Saul. This will be my last year Registrar-Executive Director since I will be retiring as of June 1st, 2011 and will be re-

placed by Kellie Hildebrandt.

SDHA held two Association meetings and one general meeting this year. A continuing competency seminar was included with each meeting. Four Council meetings were held on May 29 & October 16, 2010 and February 5 & March 26th, 2011. The meetings also contained Council educational sessions.

Public representatives play a crucial role in our Council's mandate of protecting the public. They are a welcome addition to Council and have made significant contributions to discussions and evaluative processes utilized during Council meetings. SDHA thanks Kathy Bradford and Gladys Junop for their time and efforts on the SDHA Council.

Council continues to develop the Ends that were revised and updated at the Strategic Planning Session with membership in 2008. Strategies were developed and our Ends were revised to reflect the strategic planning outcomes.

Our Ends are:

- (1) Competent dental hygiene practice;
- (2) Improved access to dental hygiene practice;
- (3) Awareness of the unique contribution of the dental hygiene profession and;
- (4) Promotion of Dental Hygienists as primary health care providers for clients.

Meetings and Activities

The Registrar-Executive Director represents SDHA on the National Dental Hygiene Certification Board (NDHCB) and attended the NDHCB meeting in Winnipeg. I attend the provincial Network of Interdisciplinary Organizations (NIRO) meetings and chaired the NIRO meeting last spring. I chaired the Saskatchewan Oral Health Professions Forum meeting in Saskatoon on October 26th, 2010 . This committee reviewed the terms of reference, created the Infection Control committee which SDHA has appointed two representatives to participate on. Discussion was held regarding the CDSS policies.

I am chairperson of the Dental Hygiene Advisory Board. We held our annual meeting on October 26th, 2010. The ac-

creditation that was conduced in May of 201 was discussed and the subsequent recommendations.

The Federation of Dental Hygiene Regulatory Authorities (FDHRA) held their annual meeting in Winnipeg on September 30th, 2010. The Registrar-ED holds the position of Chairperson and Treasurer for the FDHRA. The FDHRA collaborated with the Education Advisory Committee in the development of Entry-to-Practice National Competencies and Standards for Canadian Dental Hygienists. These competencies and standards have impacted the Dental Commission of Accreditation, as they will accredit dental hygiene programs to the new standards as well as impacting the National Dental Hygiene Examination Board who are preparing their examinations to meet these competencies and standards. This in turn, has impacted Canadian dental hygiene programs that will be incorporating the Entry-to-Practice National Competencies and Standards for Canadian Dental Hygienists in their education programs.

It is important to foster good relations with the other dental professionals and health professionals in Saskatchewan. The Saskatchewan Dental Professions Annual Scientific Session held in Saskatoon on September 9 to 11th was an excellent venue for our professional associations to collaborate on a scientific and social level. The 2011 session will be held September 15-17 in Regina.

Competency Assurance and Disciplinary Processes

No formal complaints were received.

Twenty-six members did not renew their licences as of March 15th, 2010. Thirty-two conditional licences were issued in 2010. There are an increased number of dental hygienists being educated in Ontario and relocating or returning to Saskatchewan to practice. Ontario does not have local anesthesia (LA) in their scope of practice or included in their dental hygiene programs. These new registrants licence as a conditional member and are given two years to obtain their LA credential.

A total of 24 Letters of Good Standing were provided for members in 2010. In 2010, 58 new dental hygienists registered and licenced in Saskatchewan of which 46 were recent graduates. Of the recent graduates 24 were from the 2010 graduating class of 26 hygienists at SIAST dental hygiene program and 21 were from various programs in Ontario and one from Wyoming. No candidate accessed the Dental Hygiene Re-entry Course operated by SIAST.

SDHA maintains a pool of members to participate on the Professional Conduct and Discipline Committees if the Committees are required to conduct an investigation of a complaint. Members are requested to volunteer for membership on the Professional Conduct and Discipline Committees at the Annual General Meeting.

Continuing Competency (CC) Programs

It is a Saskatchewan registrants' professional responsibility to determine their specific continuing competency needs and to pursue activities that enable them to maintain competency in their dental hygiene practice. SDHA Members are currently required to achieve, for each three-year reporting period, a total of at least 50 Continuing Competency (CC) credits with a minimum of 30 credits from the

specific Category A (Dental Hygiene Practice). SDHA has completed the final year of a three-year transition process from the previous requirements of 36 Continuing Competency (CC) credits with a minimum of 18 credits from the specific Category A. As members' reporting periods ended they began a reporting period to meet the new requirements. The year ending December 31, 2010 was the first year that the new requirements of 50 credits were mandatory for all SDHA members. All members met the continuing competency requirements for the reporting period January 1, 2008 to December 31st, 2010. The CC request forms for credit are recorded in the SDHA database and all members received annual CC Transcripts in July.

The SDHA Continuing Competency (CC) Committee has directed the evolution of the Personal Learning Tool (PL Tool). Each Saskatchewan dental hygienist maintains evidence of their professional development. The PL Tool assists the SDHA membership in their selfdetermination of learning during continuing education opportunities and to aid application of the knowledge gained to Practice Standards of the profession. The CDHA/SDHA Practice Standards that are used in conjunction with the PL Tool apply to all aspects of day-today dental hygiene practice. The Practice Standards are used by dental hygienists to assess dental hygiene practices and to identify learning goals that will direct continuing quality improvement activities. Each member retains their completed Personal Learning Tool Forms. The individual Credit application form is still required to be completed and submitted for CC credits.

The Continuing Competency Committee randomly audits 10% of dental hygienists' Personal Learning Tool Forms on an annual basis. 2010 was the first year the audit took place. The audit process was developed and carried out on a random selection of thirteen members who were at the end of their three-year reporting period. Those selected had three months notice to submit their completed PL Tool forms. The auditor reviewed the forms to ensure all the required evidence of continuing professional development had been included and all successfully completed the audit.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on May 2nd 2010 in Regina with a continuing competency program focusing on Alzheimer's disease, oral health products and tattooing & oral piercing. Chris Gordon and Gerrard Weinberger were re-elected to Council filling two vacant positions. Diane Moore attended the SDHA Council meetings as the SIAST Dental Hygiene Program representative as a non-voting member during the 2010–2011 term and will continue next year.

The 2011 AGM will be held on May 7th in Saskatoon with a continuing competency program focusing on Oral Health Care in Long-Term Care Facilities and the presentation of the recently developed Jurisprudence Program and accompanying examination.

The SDHA Member's Meeting at the 2010 Annual Scientific Session was well attended. The meeting included a presentation by Doris Lavois the Executive Director of the National Dental Hygiene Certification Board.

On October 2nd, 2010 SDHA sponsored a hands-on CC opportunity at SIAST in conjunction with Dentsply. Lisa Shoemaker presented "Hands on with Cavitron® Ultrasonic Systems"

Twenty-three participants completed the local aesthesia program conducted by Dr. Brenda Scarfe on October 9th and 10th, 2010.

Duane Banman presented an interactive SDHA sponsored professional development program on back stabilization on November 6th, 2010 at SIAST. Unfortunately the afternoon session's presenter had to cancel due to personal reasons.

SDHA has been developing a partnership for continuing competency programs of mutual interest with the College of Dental Surgeons of Saskatchewan (CDSS), the Saskatchewan Dental Therapists Association (SDTA) and the Saskatchewan Dental Assistants Association (SDAA). We are looking forward to continued collaboration..

Overview of Major Issues and Activities of the Association

The important collaboration and links with CDHA continue to strengthen our Association. The CDHA is extremely supportive towards many of our mutual ends. We will see changes and further development in our CDHA-SDHA web-site link. The joint website has been constantly improving and contains significant information providing many avenues for communications for all members of SDHA at a local, provincial and national level. Human Resource needs have been met through a joint initiative between CDHA-SDHA where employment opportunities are placed on-line on the members' only side of the CDHA web site. A private employment placement agency operates in Saskatchewan for dental assistants, receptionists and dental hygienists. "Filling in 4 You" provides job placements for casual work, short or long term positions and permanent employment. This agency has recently come under new ownership by Janelle Thievin.

The SDHA public website has been upgraded and will continue to evolve. The website can be found at: www.SDHA.ca. This website is for the public to access information about our association.

National Dental Hygienists Week was celebrated during Oral Health Month on April 11 to 17th, 2010. SIAST dental hygiene students planned several events. SDHA has participated in the Leader Post and Star Phoenix's campaigns; "Tobacco Cessation" and "March is Nutrition Month". SDHA collaborates with the Canadian Cancer Association on their telephone/fax referral help line as a major supporter.

As this will be my last annual report in this position I would like to thank the dental hygienists of Saskatchewan for giving me the opportunity to work on your behalf. It has been a pleasure to work with such an exceptional group of dedicated health care professionals. Thank you to the SDHA and the SDHA Council for all your support. I have lived and breathed dental hygiene for the past thirty years and I sincerely hope my efforts have made a contribution to the profession that I love.

SIAST Dental Hygiene Program Report

Faculty and students in the SIAST Dental Hygiene Program have contributed to an amazing year. It has been a year of looking ahead and implementing new innovations and working with new technologies. These are probably all the same things that every dental hygienist has encountered this year. Well, the students are certainly prepared to enter your world!

Students

There are 25 students in year 1 and 26 in year 2. Of the year 1 students, 57% are dental assistants and 31% have some other post secondary education. In the graduating class, 57% have taken dental assisting, and 37% have additional post secondary education. The majority of students come from urban areas.

Faculty

The faculty implemented several projects this year, using new technology. SIAST has gone digital! We have a scanner, and students now learn intraoral radiography techniques using plates instead of film. Of course, as with the implementation of all new technology, the backup plan was used, but the growing pains have lessened and we are appreciating the benefits of electronic imaging. For next fall, we are anticipating the uploading of all course reading material to the SIAST library site, where students will be able to access it from anywhere, and not have to lug heavy coursepacks in their bookbags. A third use of electronic data will be the with program timetables. Brenda Udahl has been working with computer science students to develop a program to make the scheduling process more efficient.

Dean Lefebvre was welcomed as a full time faculty member in August. Dean's enthusiasm and clinical experience are appreciated by both faculty and students. Cyndi Mowat is retiring in June, and her expertise in the Rad Lab will be missed.

Most recently, faculty completed a survey for the NDHCB, in which they ranked the new national competencies for criticality and frequency, and participated in a Webinar to discuss electronic clinical grading systems.

Program News

The Application Selection Process for the 2011-2012 class is underway. The program received fewer applications this spring, but will continue to use the High Demand Admission Process for another year.

Several changes will be made to the curriculum, as a result of the recommendations from the Commission on Dental Accreditation in Canada (CDAC), the integration of the new national competencies and from participating in a major curriculum review, which all SIAST programs undergo every six years. A part of this review is a curriculum validation, where practicing dental hygienists are asked to review the curriculum to ensure it includes all the current skills and knowledge required in dental hygiene practice.

Students continue to be innovative in the community health projects they develop and implement. One of the new projects is a partnership with the Regina Food Bank and the Regina Qu'Appelle Health District. Interested clients of the Food Bank present for a blood pressure check, diabetes screening, and an oral health screening. They may then be referred to the SIAST Dental Hygiene Clinic or to a Live Well class, or for further interventions for diabetes. Students and faculty participated in all parts of this project, and the outcomes for the clients were far beyond what had been imagined.

Finally, the faculty and staff of the Dental Hygiene program at SIAST wish to thank everyone who participated in the mentoring program with the students. They return to school energized and enthusiastic, and ready to learn more so they can provide the comprehensive care for their clients that they've observed you so effortlessly provide.


Dental Hygiene Student's Report

In year II the dental hygiene class visited many different settings to put our knowledge to practice. The class presented to three different daycares in Regina in first semester. The presentations were interactive and provided oral health knowledge in a fun learning atmosphere for the children. For our Community Oral Health class we did three different presentations to groups needing information about oral health. Some examples of the groups that individuals in our class presented to included schools, SIAST students and programs, and care homes. We also have chosen one group individually to do an extensive oral health education presentation to. This presentation required much preparation and research. The groups ranged from women shelters, care homes, the food bank, youth care centres, and the nursing students. These programs provided the community with valuable information as well as provided us with experience in our presentation skills and put our theory knowledge to use. The presentations are just some of the accomplishments we take pride in. Along with doing presentations we have also visited private general dental practices, orthodontic offices, dental laboratories, and periodontic offices. The experience in the diverse settings was beneficial because it prepares us to be practicing hygienists and gets us involved with the community.

As we continue to the finish line of the dental hygiene program we are completing clients in clinic and preparing for the national certification exam. The dental hygiene program has been a rewarding and exciting process. Even if it is stressful at times, we always know we are preparing for a gratifying career in Dental Hygiene.

SASKATCHEWAN DENTAL HYGIENISTS' ASSOCIATION Organizational Structure and Ends – October 2010





1. NDHCB Annual General and Board of Governors Meetings

The 2010 NDHCB Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on May 14, 2010 and the latest Board of Governors Meeting was held December 7, 2010 by teleconference. Brenda Walker and Barbara Smith were reappointed respectively President and Vice-President for another 1-year term starting in January 2011. Heather Biggar joined us at the beginning of 2010 as the new British Columbia (CDHBC) representative and, in July, Stephanie Gordon replaced Kellie Hildebrandt as the Manitoba (CDHM) representative Governor.

Our Ends for 2011 read:

The National Dental Hygiene Certification Board exists so that Canadian Regulators, acting in the public interest, have reliable and valid testing mechanisms for assessing current dental hygiene competencies.

This is further defined, in order of priority as:

Canadian Regulators trust our testing mechanisms for assessing entry level competencies.

They will recognize that examinations measure current dental hygiene knowledge, judgement and skills.

Examination candidates/applicants are able to participate in the examination process within a reasonable amount of time and at a reasonable cost.

- They will be provided with clear, defensible criteria for eligibility to 'sit' the exam.
- They will have adequate exam parameters.
- They will receive an exam that is free of bias.
- They will have feedback that identifies areas for improvement.

Educators, accreditors of dental hygiene educational programs and dental hygiene professionals will recognize and champion the quality, validity and reliability of national dental hygiene certification.

2. National Dental Hygiene Certification Examination Development

Staff:

Item Writing and Group Reviews

Our item bank has been expanded to facilitate the transition of our exam from a paper and pencil format to electronic delivery for everyone (starting with our January 2011 exam). To this end, we held multiple Item Writing training/group review sessions over the past couple of years. We currently have a pool of about 50 Dental hygiene educators from across the country, trained to write new items with about half still actively writing. All are using secure Web-based software that allows remote online item writing from their home or office so that these Subject Matter Experts can write new items year-round. So far over 1,200 new items have been submitted/reviewed using this software.

We recently started developing more sophisticated items using radiographs, to be used on future exams now that they are delivered electronically. Our goal is to develop more sophisticated items using pictures/photographs, pictograms, drag and drop multiple choice items, decision-based scenarios. etc., over the next few years.

Online Item Appraisal

Every new exam item written has to go through a series of steps before it gets approved to appear on an exam form. One of these important steps is the regional appraisal by teams of independent SMEs from across Canada also using a secure online item appraisal tool.

NDHCE Examination Committee

Subject Matter Experts, staff and a representative from Performance Assessment Group, our psychometrics consultants, met on numerous occasions to oversee all test preparation and evaluation activities related to the examination development, including the revision of the NDHCB Blueprint for the exam based on the latest National Dental Hygiene Competencies.

National Dental Hygiene Certification Board Report (continued...)

Working Group on the Validation of the French Translation of the Exam

The Working Group on the Validation of the French Translation of the Exam, comprised of experienced bilingual Dental Hygienists, met to review and validate the translation of all exam

Online Preparation Test

The NDHCB is now offering two distinct versions of its online prep test. To date, over 2,500 individuals have taken at least one of these two 75 item bilingual online tests in preparation for their NDHCE. The prep tests are currently being managed by ProExams, a division of Yardstick Software; an Edmonton based company - they also administer the NDHCE for us. The Prep Tests are available through our website and provide candidates with detailed feedback about their performance by offering extensive rationales for the various answer options with direct reference to textbook sources and blueprint competencies.

Computer Based Testing (CBT)

ProExams conducted a pilot of the CBT version of the exam on September 20, 2010 for 47 candidates in the Toronto and Edmonton areas. In January 2011, the NDHCE was offered in electronic forms through ProExams-certified computerized testing centres for all 297 candidates. All computerized testing centres are located within a one hour drive (100 km) of every accredited Canadian DH school across the country that is fielding candidates in a specific exam. The electronic version of the NDHCE is a 4-hour exam (180 scored items and 20 nonscored items) delivered electronically in random order, three times per year over 1-3 day "windows" in January, May and September of each year. The exam is delivered in a format similar to (but shorter than) our paper and pencil version. Starting in May 2011, in an effort to further increase security and limit item exposure, the items will also be selected "onthe-fly" from a pool of pre-selected items. The next step is to introduce Adaptive Testing by 2013-2014 and possibly offer year round testing shortly after that time.

Online Applications

Most NDHCE candidates now access an interactive online application form to register for the exam that includes online payment by credit card, uploaded digital pictures of themselves for ID purposes and overall better accuracy of the information collected since they type it in themselves and it is transferred directly to our database. Following the application deadline, Canadian dental hygiene program directors receive access codes and are asked to verify the identity and eligibility of their students/new graduates online. This eliminates the need for manual signatures on behalf of students within 4 months of program completion and transcripts and diplomas for graduates of accredited schools who are applying for the exam.

Quality Assurance (QA) Test

The NDHCB has been contracted to develop a Quality Assurance assessment tool on behalf of the College of Dental Hygienists of British Columbia (CDHBC). The NDHCB will develop of a 75 item QA test (delivered on-the-fly from a pool of 110

items) that will be administered every year to approximately 20% of all RDHs in BC starting in 2012-13. It will also be renewed/replaced every 2 years.

Since the NDHCB will own the test, it can also be offered to other jurisdictions that might have a need for a similar program.

3. National Dental Hygiene Certification Examination (NDHCE) Administration

NDHCE Results & Projections

A compilation of the NDHCE results over the past few years shows that the total number of candidates per year seems to be slowly decreasing:

(see table next page)

With the new program registration policies for private programs adopted in 2010 by the Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities (MTCU) in Ontario, we are expecting that a few non-accredited schools will soon be closing and the number of exam candidates should stabilize at between 1,600 and 1,700 per year over the next few years.

15 non-accredited Canadian programs (all from Ontario - 2 of them already closed) had candidates in at least one of the 2010 examination administrations. The table below shows how the candidates from non-accredited Canadian programs, non-accredited international programs and accredited programs globally fared over the last 2 years.

(see table next page)

It should be noted that the results for candidates from nonaccredited programs are on average much lower than those from accredited ones.

Evaluation of Graduates from Non-Accredited Dental Hygiene **Programs**

In 2010, we approved eligibility for 265 applicants from 15 non-accredited Canadian programs (we conducted a total of 29 "group" evaluations as some colleges had 2 or 3 graduating classes in the same year). All applicants who graduated from a non-accredited Canadian program and whose evaluations were completed were found eligible except for one candidate, who had started at an accredited school and then transferred to a non-accredited. She was turned down because the "receiving" school could not provide enough evidence that a systematic and thorough transfer evaluation process had occurred which meant that we could not conduct a proper evaluation of her overall DH formal education.

As for graduates of international non-accredited programs. we approved eligibility for 7 individuals; denied 5 and 5 more are still awaiting documentation or are under evaluation.

NDHCE Testing Accommodations

The NDHCB offers candidates with disabilities information on the testing accommodations that are available. Testing accommodations can include extra time, a separate room, and in some cases, an audio version of the exam. This information is directly available on the NDHCB website. In 2010, we received and granted 11 requests for special accommodations.

Exam Security

In 2010, in order to increase security, we created 2 separate forms of each exam for each administration so that candidates sitting next to one another didn't have the same items in the same order. Caveon Test Security, LLC also conducted an extensive data forensics analysis of all results after each exam and was able to identify eight individuals with apparent irregular testing patterns following the May 2010 administration. These individuals were then put "under review" pending further investigation. After concluding our investigation of the evidence in our possession

we proceeded to cancel 2 of those results but allowed the individuals to re-write at the next regular examination administration. The other "under review" candidates were granted their certificate.

It should be noted that even though we have moved to computerized testing in 2011, we will still retain the services of Caveon to conduct a thorough data forensics analysis starting with our May examination and will be monitoring new data such as "lag time" on specific items and other singularities in testing pattern.



DENTISTRY WITHIN LONG TERM CARE FACILITIES... A TEAM APPROACH

This presentation will provide a description of the oral health programs being provided by Dr. Bhargava and his dental team for residents of long term care facilities and mobile dentistry for homebound patients.
